Dear community,

We present you the 2024 annual report of the Erasmus Graduate School of Social Sciences and the Humanities.

We had a very succesful year with 63 courses and workshops on offer and over 700 course participants.

We also hosted several events, varying from onboarding sessions for new PhD candidates, to a conversation on the topic of academics and activism with Ruard Ganzevoort (rector of ISS), a designathon on AI in transdisciplinary research and of course our annual award ceremony.

Our Head of Studies, dr. Fadi Hirzalla, started an educational project on how to improve our course descriptions, curricular synergy and educational inclusiveness as part of his Senior Teaching Qualification (SKO). The implementation of the results will start as from the academic year 2025/2026.

Lastly, we said goodbye to our PhD handbook in 2024. The handbook was severely outdated. Although the hard copy version will be missed, we felt that a more sustainable solution would be appropriate and we created a FAQ page on our website.

Courses on mandatory topics

As the EUR's PhD policy on education on the topics of open science, data management and professionalism and integrity in research was not very well-known within our PhD community, as a graduate school we chose to communicate education on these subjects is mandatory.

This led to a wave of PhD candidates wanting to take our courses on these subjects. In 2024, we accommodated almost 100 PhD's for the integrity course. Unfortunately, we were not able to meet the high demand for the open science courses (45 seats only) due to capacity problems in the EUR's open science advisory team. Together with EUR's Academic Affairs and the open science advisory team we worked hard on finding a solution and we are sure together we will solve this problem.

Figure 3. **Course participation** by unique participants 2024

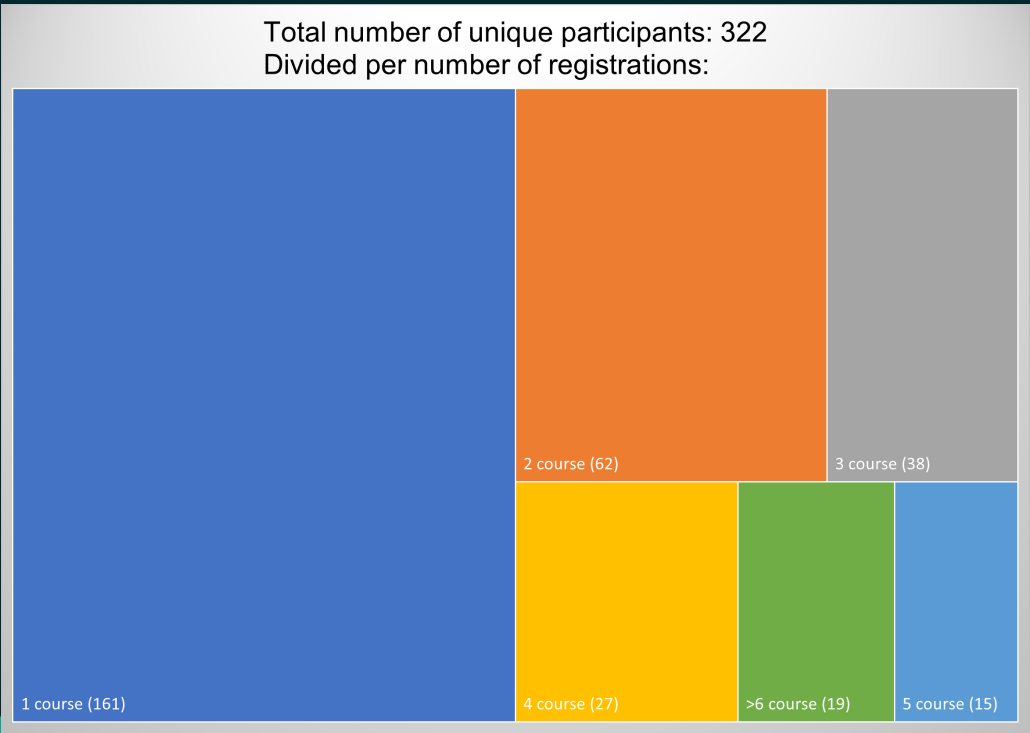


Figure 4. **Percentage of students that would recommend the course**

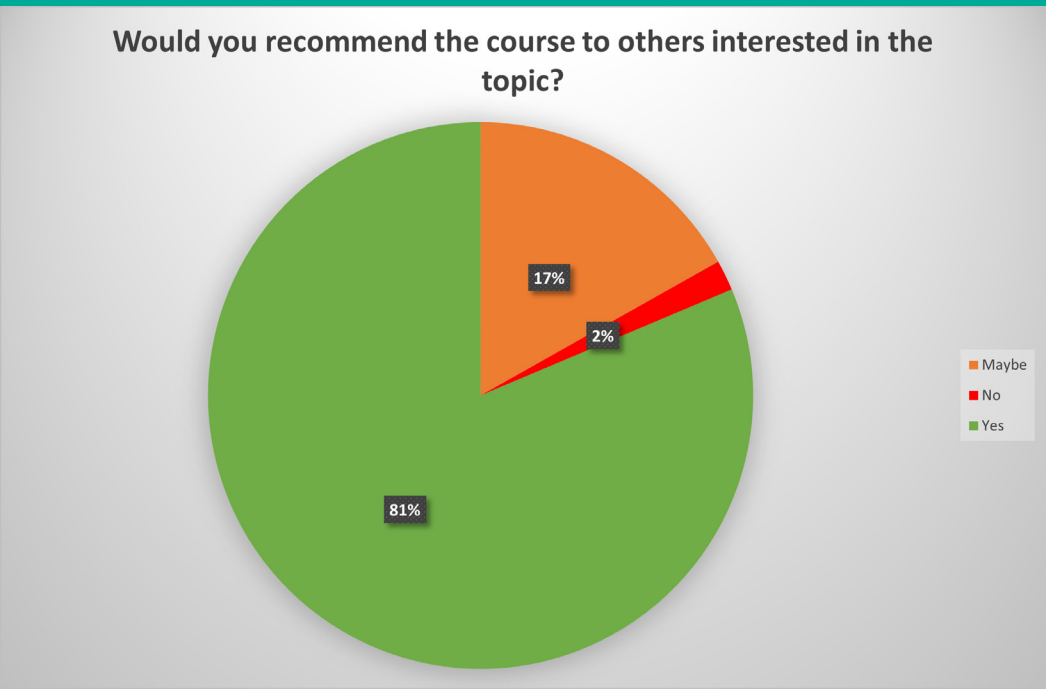
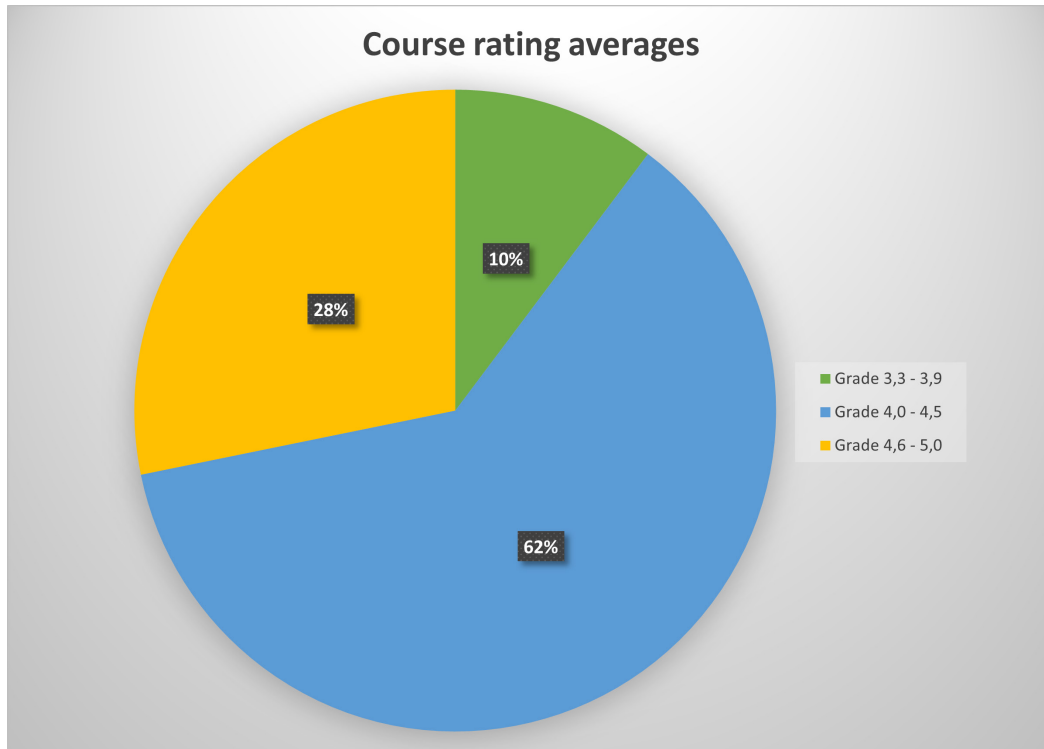


Figure 5. **Evaluations 2024**

Methodology consultant dr. Fadi Hirzalla

Our methodology consultant, dr. Fadi Hirzalla, held 4 sessions in the year 2024 with individual candidates, helping them with fundamental reflection and concrete directions for method and research issues.

Sound governance and administration

In 2024 the management team has met twice with the Supervisory Board and also twice with the Programme Board.

Throughout the year, our team also had quarterly meetings with the PhD officers of our faculties and institutes and the EGSH PhD council.

Collaborations

UNIC

UNIC is a European alliance of eight universities based in post-industrial cities with a mission to boost mobility and inclusion for societal impact. UNIC was formed as a response to the European Commission's call to create bottom-up networks of universities throughout Europe that enable students to obtain degrees by combining studies in several EU countries.

Erasmus University Rotterdam has joined Koc University Istanbul, Ruhr University Bochum, University of Liege, University College Cork, University of Deusto, University of Oulu, and University of Zagreb to form the UNIC alliance. UNIC is an alliance today but strives to be a model for the European Universities of tomorrow by embodying common values and visions of our shared European future.

In 2024, the Erasmus Graduate School of Social Sciences and the Humanities continued to be involved in the collaboration, although there were no joint events or activities.

Convergence: the AI, data and digitalisation theme

In co-operation with the Convergence we organised a designathon for PhD candidates working at the intersection of AI and other disciplines.

The designathon, with the appealing topic of designing a personal experience for a game for cancer research took place at ECDA at the Erasmus campus. The designathon was experienced as very productive and fruitful and the outcomes were used by Changegamers in the design for the first release of the game.
