Mission

On May 12th, 2006, the Center for Historical Culture (CHC) was established at Erasmus University Rotterdam. The Center initiates, coordinates and produces academic research on historical culture. The term *historical culture* refers to various forms of historical understanding and relationships to the past in society. The CHC has an international research network with academic and public sectors through cooperative relationships with institutions, such as:

Research program

The Center for Historical Culture investigates the impact of global encounters on historical cultures since the late eighteenth century. Its research program aims both to further on theoretical reflection and conducting empirical research.

Historical culture is closely linked to the mediation of memories and identities within a community, resulting in exclusion and inclusion of people. The construction of a 'we' opposed to a 'they' particularly plays a role in discussions on national identity and politics of assimilation. Politicians and policy makers often try to influence historical culture. Modern media contribute to the canonization and (re)mediation of historical knowledge that articulates the identity of a nation. In this way, 'good' behavior of the own group is emphasized in the past, mostly against the background of 'bad' behavior of others. Committed genocides must be forgotten rapidly, but the good and unifying elements from the past must be preserved and cultivated.

The **central question** of the CHC research program is: *what cross-cultural interactions and constructions of identities have been involved in giving meaning to the past since the late 18th century and what are the (unintended) effects on historical cultures in the globalizing, postcolonial world?*

Nine research projects focus on collective memory and historical consciousness; popular culture and violent legacies; social and political modernization; the traveling of things; the construction and appropriation of historical knowledge in history text books; collecting things and heritage education:

- 2. Education policy (Hagenaars)
- 3. Heritage and heritage education (Grever / Dibbits / Groffen / Van de Laar)
- 4. History textbooks (Van der Vlies / Van Berkel / Jüngen)

Organization

The main activities of the CHC are the exchange of research in the research group with national and foreign scholars, the publication of books and articles, the organization of national and international workshops and conferences, and the cultivation of elaborate contacts with public history and educational institutes.

Based on the large international collection of history textbooks, literature and audio-visual materials, donated by the Dutch history teacher trainer and textbook author Leo Dalhuisen, the CHC and Erasmus University Library have created a unique collection in the field of history teaching and history didactics. The **History Didactics Collection** (HDC) is almost fully indexed and searchable through the Library Catalogue. More than 5.000 titles are available.

We closely collaborate with staff members of the two other departments in the ESHCC and Erasmus Studio: prof.dr. Koen van Eijck is second supervisor of the PhD project by Piet Hagenaars; prof.dr. Stijn Reijnders, prof.dr. Jeroen Jansz and prof.dr. Franciska de Jong are supervisors of the four research projects within the Research Excellence Initiative program *War! Popular Culture and European Heritage of Major Armed Conflicts;* prof.dr. Paul van de Laar and prof.dr. Hester Dibbits supervise the NWO project on collecting suburbia heritage of Mayke Groffen. Next, we collaborate with the Centre for Global Heritage and Development LDE (Leiden, Delft, Erasmus) regarding the theme Heritage and Identity.

In February 2016, the CHC has founded with two other organizations the **International Network Popular Uses of the Past (POPUP)**: the <u>Institute for Public History</u> (IPG) at Ghent University in Belgium and the <u>Master programme History</u> at the University of Cologne in Germany. Recently the Utrecht University has joined our network. In the near future the Australian Centre for Public History (Sydney) will join POPUP as well (see www.eshcc.eur.nl/english/chc/center for historical culture/popup/).

Recently, the CHC has initiated together with the Open University and the Hogeschool Rotterdam the **Professional Learning Network Heritage and Identity** (PLG Erfgoed & Identiteit) for history teachers and teacher trainers (see www.eshcc.eur.nl/english/chc/research/plg_erfgoed_en_identiteit_in_dutch/).

The CHC produces a *CHC News Letter* twice a year, distributed to ca 500 scholars all over the world (www.eshcc.eur.nl/english/chc/center for historical culture/newsletter/).
