Opening Speech

The Climate Justice University

Reimagining higher education for transformative social change

Transformative, structural and systemic change is needed to address the climate crisis which is exacerbating social injustices, economic inequities, ecological devastation, and health disparities in communities around the world. During this time of growing instability and human suffering, this opening speech proposes that we collectively reimagine the role of higher education in advancing climate justice and promoting societal transformation toward a more just, healthy, and stable future. A commitment to both climate justice, which includes economic justice and ecological health, provides a helpful framework for colleges and universities to leverage their unique position in society and align their many initiatives and programs to contribute to transformative change for the common good.

<u>About the speaker</u>

Prof. Dr. Jennie C. Stephens is a climate justice scholar-activist and the author of Diversifying Power: Why We Need Antiracist, Feminist Leadership on Climate and Energy (Island Press, 2020). She is the Dean's Professor of Sustainability Science & Policy at Northeastern University, and her collaborations focus on energy justice, fossil-fuel phaseout, energy democracy, gender, race and power in climate/energy policy, and reimagining the role of universities to accelerate transformation toward a more just, healthy and stable future.

Workshops Round 1

The Transdisciplinary University

In this workshop, we explore how a university can create room for transdisciplinary research. Using creative methods, we redesign institutional structures and values (e.g. funding structures, rewarding system, leadership) to foster action-oriented and collaborative forms of research.

About the facilitators

Dr. Julia Wittmayer is Assistant Professor at the Erasmus School of Social and Behavioural Sciences (ESSB), a senior researcher and advisor at DRIFT (Dutch Research Institute of Transitions) and transformative research lead at the Design Impact Transition (DIT) platform. Her work focuses on social innovations in, and the governance of, transformative change processes in urban areas, the energy system and academia.

Femke Coops is a PhD student at the Eindhoven University of Technology and the Design Impact Transition (DIT) platform. In her work, she researches the role of design within complex societal challenges – and how the disciplines of design and transition can learn from each other.

Currently he is working on a book entitled 'The Humane Economy'. His most recent book: 'Doing the Right Thing' introduces a value based approach to the economy.

Workshop Round 2

The Fluid University

The disciplines we have created cannot deal with the complex societal challenges we face. We are in a crisis of practice, rather than a crisis of knowledge (we know enough, but don't know how to move forward). How can disciplines really come together? Let's explore how to exchange practices and discover the new meaning and value that emerges in the intersections.

The Regenerative University

In this methodologically experimental workshop, we will use micro-phenomenology and 'reverse fishbowling' to co-imagine futures for a regenerative university in 2043. In doing so, we will take a systemic lens – exploring what it would be like to live, teach, research, and work with and in the potential of what a university system could become. The session will be guided by the expertise network systemic co-design (ESC).

Frank Evers is the program manager of the systemic co-design network and owner of educational design agency PerfectStorm.

Bas van den Berg is assistant professor in the expertise network systemic co- design and regenerative education expert at The Hague University of Applied Sciences.

Dr. Guido Stompff is professor design thinking at Inholland University of Applied Sciences and member of the expertise network.

About the expertise network systemic co-design (ESC)

Launched in 2022, the ESC brings together experts from the social sciences, design, and sustainability sciences to integrate systemic work, system's thinking, and co-design for navigating complex societal transitions. The network consists of five universities of applied sciences.

The 4-day University

Imagine this: the classroom moves into the ocean. Students stand with both feet in the water, observing the waves. During this workshop, we'll explore what a sea-based learning approach in the "living classroom" of the ocean could look like, and develop a speculative syllabus for an immersive and multi-sensorial course on waves that takes place in the North Sea.

Tamara de Groot is a lecturer in the Humanities at Erasmus University College, member of the lectorate Transdisciplinary Education Innovation at Codarts University of the Arts, and involved in the development of transdisciplinary (teacher) education across three higher education institutions: Codarts, Willem De Kooning Academy and Erasmus University. She's currently writing her PhD dissertation on innovative educational practices that combine artistic, scientific, and societal knowledges.
