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Introduction

Females in Academia Moving towards Equity (FAME) is is a university-wide, interdisciplinary initiative committed to enhancing the participation, empowerment, and professional success of women faculty and professional services employees at all ranks within Erasmus University Rotterdam (EUR). Community

FAME serves as a network for female academics and professional service staff across the university. All employees at EUR can join the community by subscribing to the mailing list by emailing fame@eur.nl. Through the mailing list, the Board disseminates information, shares resources, and announces opportunities for participation in events, awards, workshops, and other programming.

In 2024, the FAME community grew significantly, almost doubling in size—from approximately 40 members to 79. The Board continues to expand outreach efforts and foster engagement among members.

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Activities

Negotiation for Women Workshops

In 2024, FAME organized two fully booked half-day workshops on negotiation skills for women:

- 15 February 2024: Facilitated by Dorothy Grandia, Associate Director of the Erasmus Centre for Women in Organisations (ECWO), with 21 participants.
- 28 November 2024: Facilitated by Linda van der Wal, an external trainer, with 12 participants.

Talk by Prof. Dr. Rosalba Icaza Garza

On 23 September 2024, Prof. Dr. Rosalba Icaza Garza's (ISS) spoke about the (im)possibilities of equity and social justice in academia on Woudestein campus.




Figure 2 Professor Rosalba Icaza Garza offered a lively discussion over social justice goals within universities

Rosalba's talk identified conditions that hamper justice and equity in teaching and research\ and offered some thoughts on how to respond to those conditions even if one is in the margins or outside universities. She also explained her decolonial feminist praxis and ethics, and the role that intersectionality plays in social justice work in universities. The talk rounded up with concrete examples in research and teaching that connect equity and social justice goals within universities and the larger society.

The talk brought together colleagues from across faculties and services departments who reflected on the challenges they face to

promote equity and social justice in their everyday at EUR. Rosalba finished with an invitation to reflect on the importance of classrooms and curricula as spaces of transformation for social and epistemic justice.



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An Introduction to Menopause and Work with Sophia Franklin, MD

On 9 December 2024, FAME, in partnership with the Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Access (IDEA) Center, hosted a discussion on menopause in the workplace, featuring Sophia Franklin, MD as the keynote speaker. Sophia Franklin, MD is an occupational health physician working independently and at the Polikliniek Mens en Arbeid with a passion for women's health and menopause in particular. She is involved in developing a guideline for occupational health physicians (NVAB) about menopausal transition and work. She is also an advisor at the Netherlands Labour Authority and a member of the Menopause Consortium Study, through which she is conducting research on menopause and complaints of the musculoskeletal system (joints, muscle, connective tissue).

The session increased awareness, as well as educated on what menopause is and how it can impact work. It also provided tips to mitigate menopausal symptoms and provided information for managers on how to support colleagues experiencing menopause. The event attracted nearly 70 participants and received highly positive feedback. Many attendees expressed a strong interest in continuing discussions and initiatives on this topic, which some of them did immediately after the event over drinks.

FAME Athena Award

For the tenth year in a row, the FAME board organized the Athena Award, a prize presented to EUR employees or students who support female talent within the academic environment. In 2024, the award, for the first time, was aimed at honoring an individual who stimulates early career female talent. The jury commended her for her significant contributions to gender equity, including her research on rank and salary disparities at ESE, her successful proposals to address these inequalities, and her role in establishing a mentoring program for junior faculty. Prof. Dr. Pilar García-Gómez was formally awarded the Athena Award at the Dies Natalis on 8 November 2024 by Chief Diversity Officer, Prof. Dr Jane Murray Cramm, and Dr. Ellen van Schoten, vice chair of the EUR executive board. The prize was an original painting by Sofja Wolsky.

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Finances

FAME operates on an annual budget of \in 3,000. For the negotiation workshops, we asked for a small contribution from the participants (\in 10-15 per person) to avoid last-minute cancellations or no-shows - a strategy that proved effective.

Looking ahead to 2025

As of January 2025, FAME Board welcomes a new member: Prof. Dr Rosalba Icaza Garza, Institute for Social Studies (ISS).

FAME remains committed to advancing gender equity at EUR through advocacy, networking, and skillbuilding initiatives. The Board looks forward to another year of meaningful engagement and impactful activities in 2025. This will include the continued organization of the FAME Athena Award, with a call for nominations to be circulated over the summer break. As in previous years, the winner will be announced during the EUR Dies Natalis in November. The FAME board will be administering a survey in early 2025 to hear from the membership about what type of programming they find most valuable heading into 2025. In 2025, the FAME budget will be increased to €4,000 for the year.

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
