Criteria at item level

Stem	
	The questions are phrased independently. There are <u>no</u> answers needed from previous questions. (errors are not cumulative)
	The language used in the question is grammatically correct, unambiguous and concise.
	Only one topic/problem is focused on per (sub) question.
	The questions are phrased positively. Whenever negations are unavoidable, <u>not</u> or <u>none</u> are
	underscored
	The question is <u>not</u> a trick question
	The question contains no unintended hints for answering the question.
	The question can be answered without reading the answer possibilities first.
	The question is clearly distinguished from the introduction
Answer alternatives	
	The alternatives all provide an equal answer to the question. <i>Directive: no alternatives like 'all of the above' or 'none of the above'.</i>
	The alternatives are phrased positively. Whenever negations are unavoidable, <u>not</u> or <u>none</u> are underscored.
	There is minimal overlap between the alternatives (directive: one answer is 100% correct, the rest 100% incorrect).
	The question and answers are grammatically compatible.
	The alternatives are ordered logically (or consistent random). For example by alphabet or in numerical order
	Important concepts from the question are <u>no</u> t repeated in just one of the answer alternatives (distractor)
	The alternatives are formulated clearly, unambiguously, and concise.
Contextual information	
	The use of contextual information (e.g. pictures, figures, text, and tables) is functional.
	There are correct and clear references in the question(s) to the provided contextual
	information
	The context contains no unnecessary information (unless the objectives include the ability to
	filter relevant information).
	The context is presented clearly and the information is correct.
