### Introduction

To be honest my original plan was to study in the Far East because the bigger the cultural shock the better. When in the end I was selected for a semester abroad in our big brother Germany I was a bit disappointed. But now that I am back I am so grateful for one of the best experiences in my life.

# **Preparations**

First of all, it important to realize that in Munich the semester starts the 16th of October. This limits you in the subjects you can choose because otherwise there may be an overlap with the exams in Rotterdam and Munich. Besides all the standard procedures, where the Erasmus university will help you with, preparing yourself for a study abroad is rather easy. I believe it is important to figure out for yourself what you want to gain from this period. In my case I wanted to improve my German and English language skill. Furthermore, meeting people from all the different cultures you will come across with, was my priority number one.

The LMU offers the opportunity to do a German language course before the beginning of the semester. This language course starts the first of September. If you decide to do this you will have to fill in some paperwork online this is very straight forward. The international office in Munich will notify you regarding the language course. Last but not least say goodbye to your friends and family but don't worry the coming five months will be over in a second.



### Arrival

The hot topic among incoming exchange students in Munich is the housing problem. You should not underestimate this, luckily if you decide to participate in the language course they can arrange housing for the first month. The language course team will help you with finding housing. It is way easier to find accommodation when you are physically in Munich so don't sweat before you are finally there.

From the 16th of October and onwards you can get a semester ticket for the well-organized public transportation in Munich. So for the first month buy a one-month ticket or be healthy and get a bike.

Making new friends in Munich is rather easy. Logically all the participants in the language course are exchange students so you will have the feeling you are not in Germany at all but in a melting pot of cultures. All these people are new and eager to get to know you. My first month was crazy because the majority of these people reside in the same dormitories provided by the language course, so drinking beers with 50 something exchange students is more than normal. Moreover, the language course offers a cultural program that takes you to some sights.

### Courses

German Preparation Course (6ects): In my opinion almost a necessity to make the most of your time abroad. Just as everything else in Germany this is well organised and useful. Passing the test shouldn't be to difficult maybe the Oktoberfest-weeks are challenging but for the wrong reasons:p.

Bank Analysis (3ects): Quite interesting because it covers topics never discussed before in Rotterdam. If you are not interested about regulations this is not the course for you. The test is doable but time consuming for only 3 ects.

Key Topics in Leadership (3ects): The professors offering this course are great speakers and interesting to listen to. During the course you will get to know more about the modern day challenges of managers and leaders and how to cope with the problems you come across with. The exam is easy.

Corporate Finance (6ects): The most challenging course I took. The content looks easy on first sight but please don't underestimate the exam. It is similar to Finance I but on a higher level. The guest lecture provided by JPMorgan Chase was great.

Labour Economics (6ects): I really liked this course. The content is interesting and the professor is fun for German standards. It gives you insides about how different actors on the labour market influence each other. The course in a good mix between theory and applied math.

#### Finance

I have to say that I spend a lot of money because I wanted to have the best five months possible.

Like I said before, finding housing in Munich is difficult. I settled for 720 but 550 is possible. If you are one of the lucky few that gets housing through the university you pay way less. Food and drinks are approximately the same price as in Holland. Munich is a rich city so spending a lot of money is not difficult but if you are student finding the cheap spots shouldn't be too hard.

I spend a lot of money while traveling but again it is your decision if you want to get on these little trips.
