Joint Venture

The History Didactics Collection (HDC) was created in 2007, as a joint venture between the Center for Historical Culture (CHC) and the Erasmus University Library (UL). Its primary function is to support CHC research activities by providing source materials: secondary education history textbooks, teaching guides, didactic studies on history education, government publications on history education.

Within the UL framework the HDC has the status of a Special Collection, which receives its content from donations and acquisitions. Additional funding from the library facilitates optimizing online access: the UL online catalogue is the main communication instrument between the collection and its users. CHC and library jointly fund the cost of MA-student assistantships; assistants contribute by adding subject terms and other metadata to catalogue records, and by selecting new collection content from donations of books. Library professionals provide supervision. CHC and library work closely together in managing the growth and the quality of the collection.

Reading Room

The HDC (dedicated) Reading Room, located in the UL Building offers 140 meters of history schoolbooks and history education literature. Visitors can easily obtain publications from the shelves, and research the content at one of the 12 available study places. Selections of texts can be photocopied or digitized for further research.

Audiovisual facilities / web connectivity permit the use of the Reading Room as a lecture room for small groups. Access is granted on appointment; the UL Virtual Helpdesk administrates the process.

Visitors & activities

From 2009 to present most individual researchers visiting the Reading Room were connected to Erasmus University ESHCC/CHC: MA students, PhD students, faculty researchers. A substantial number of visitors however had a connection to another Dutch university (UvA, VU, Utrecht, Leiden, Nijmegen, Tilburg) or to a university abroad (Gent, Bergen Norway, Tokio). Foreign researchers were often interested in Dutch schoolbooks texts about their country of origin. The period of time individual researchers spent in the Reading Room varied between two days and two weeks.
